Christian Aid (12th to 18th May)

Christian Aid Week started in 1950 and Forth St Paul's has been an active supporter of this charity.



Christian Aid as a charity was founded by British and Irish Churches after the Second World War to help refugees. Nowadays it provides humanitarian aid to the poorest of countries worldwide, and works with partner organisations to end poverty and injustice world wide.

Each year the Christian Aid Week Campaign highlights one particular area where a project is making a difference. This year's appeal focussed on Burundi one of the financially poorest countries in Africa and on Aline's Story.

Aline Nibogora was abused and forced out of her home. Aline joined a community workshop led by Christian Aidfunded trainers. She learnt about Village Savings and Loans Associations and was determined to form her own to help herself and others around her. Village Savings and Loans Associations offer a way for community groups to manage, save and lend money. Aline was able to get a start-up loan and began trading avocados and peanuts. She was also able to buy a bicycle so that she could transport her goods. Aline told Christian Aid: 'We pray together as we are still alive thanks to God's grace. ... We have been through difficult times, but now we make plans for the future.'

Funds sent by Christian Aid helps to train people how to work things out for themselves so that the help will be sustained and the poorest of people can fend for themselves. The money we raised during Christian Aid Week 2024 will provide lots of help.

This year we had a bumper Christian Aid Week where we raised the wonderful grand total of £1544.40£410 from a 90k sponsored walk£546 from Christian aid envelopes£167 donated from Rainforest café on 12th May£141 from film "God's not dead 2" on 15th May£280 from bake and cake stall on 19th May

This money will go a long way to fund the projects undertaken by Christian Aid.

How is each £1 of Christian Aid's income used?

- 85p in every £1 is used for direct charitable purposes.
- Of this, 32p supports the long-term development projects, 45p is spent on humanitarian and emergencies and 8p on campaigning, advocacy and education.
- The other 15p is invested in fundraising. For every £1 we invest, Christian Aid secures more than £6 in return.

Interview with Rev Sumit Harrison

I was born and brought up in Delhi, India. I moved to Scotland in 2009.

I have an older brother who lives in Oxford and a younger sister who lives in India.

3. Please tell us a bit about your wife and children.

My wife's name is Shikha. She works for the bank and teaches part time at the University. My older boy is 10 years old and is in P5. My younger boy is 7 years old and he's in P2.

4. What are your hobbies?

I love outdoor and adventure activities; I love traveling, fishing and preaching.

- 5. What job did you want to have when growing up? I always wanted to join the Army.
- 6. If you weren't a minister, what would you be? Self-employed - have my own business.
- 7. What is your favourite thing about being a minister? Sharing Good news to all.
- 8. What is your favourite Bible story? Daniel refused to bow down to the king.
- 9. What Bible character do you most relate to and why? Yusuf – his long journey of struggle for his own people. He remained faithful to God. Suffered for his own people and established them to their better world. But in doing this, he lost his land and his family and friends.

The story of Bill Millin, the mad piper of Sword Beach

As the sun set on June 5, 1944, nearly 5,000 ships assembled off the southern coast of England, forming a fleet for the most significant amphibious invasion in history. The British, American and Canadian Armies were initiating the long awaited liberation to Nazi-occupied Europe.

At Warsash, located at the mouth of the River Hamble in Hampshire, the highly skilled Commandos of the 2,500-strong British 1st Special Service Brigade prepared to embark on their journey to Normandy. Among them was the unassuming and youthful William "Bill" Millin



of the Cameron Highlanders, serving as the personal bagpiper to the brigade's charismatic commander, Simon Fraser, 15th Lord Lovat.

Clad in a battledress tunic and the kilt of the Clan, Millin stood on the bow of the landing craft, unveiling his bagpipes. The haunting notes of "Road to the Isles" echoed as the landing craft departed from the Solent, navigating the waters between Hampshire and the Isle of Wight before entering the Channel.

Onlookers, including sailors and troops on other landing ships, although filled with tension and apprehension about the imminent challenges, erupted in cheers and tossed their helmets into the air...

"GIVE US 'HIGHLAND LADDIE,' MAN!"

As the only bagpiper and skilled soldier, 21 year old Bill Millin was destined to create a unique legacy in the stories of D-Day.

On the early morning of Tuesday, June 6, 1944, under grey skies, the Allies positioned themselves off the Normandy coast after navigating the challenging waters of the English Channel.

The crossing proved tough and damp for the troops on the landing ship and assault boats, with many seasick and eagerly awaiting the chance to disembark, regardless of the looming dangers. Millin shared the same feeling, saying, "I didn't care about what was happening onshore; I just wanted to get off that landing craft."

As Millin waded through the crashing surf, nearing the beach, Lord Lovat commanded "Give us 'Highland Laddie,' man!" Despite shivering and standing waist-deep in the water, Millin placed the mouthpiece to his lips and began playing the tune.

The resonant sound of the bagpipes became a source of encouragement for Lovat, prompting him to turn and give Millin the thumbs-up. The chosen song, a favourite march of Lovat's former regiment, the Scots Guards, held historical significance. Upon reaching the water's edge, Millin found it almost unbelievable when his commander, standing on the sandy shore with the brigade major, asked him to continue piping the rest of the Commandos ashore, this time with "The Road to the Isles."

Known as "The Mad Piper," Bill Millin found himself in the chaotic sounds of war-mortar thumps, shouting, and machine-gun fire. Undeterred, he calmy strolled along the beach, playing his bagpipes with a spirited tune as fellow soldiers streamed past.

D-Day veteran Tom Duncan recalled the impact of Millin's pipes, describing how it uplifted the spirits of the troops, fostering determination, pride and a poignant connection to home. Remarkably unscathed despite frequent exposure to the enemy fire, Piper Millin accompanied the brigade upon its return to England in September 1944.

A statue now stands near the shoreline at Sword Beach, paying tribute to the courageous D-Day Piper Bill Millin, immortalising his display of bravery. His daring acts gained recognition in Cornelious Ryan's best-selling 1959 book, "The Longest Day," and were vividly depicted in Darryl F. Zanuck's epic 1962 film of the same name.

Bill Millin's legacy extended beyond the battlefield. He played at Lord Lovat's funeral in 1995 and generously donated his Cameron kilt and bagpipes to the National War Museum in Edinburgh,

Passing away at the age of 88 on August 17, 2010, Bill Millin left behind a lasting testament to the Scottish heroism that defined his remarkable life, and now adorns the face of a brand new 50p coin issued to mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day.
